

Among Us is game of the year

In a year of social distancing and remote schooling, one game brought people together: Among Us. Every day, about 60 million people play the surprise hit of the year. The multiplayer party game came out in the summer of 2018, but it didn't get much attention until popular Twitch streamers began playing it online in the summer of 2020. By late September, Among Us had more than 100 million downloads. Later that month, more than three million gamers were playing it at the same moment.

You and your friends can set up a game, or you can join a random game. In each round, players control colorful space people, known as crewmates. You perform odd jobs around the ship, like fixing lights, repairing the engine—and catching a killer. You customize your crewmate's color, name, and hat before

the action begins. Next you choose from three different maps, each with a different design and many rooms. While most players run around fixing things, one to three players are secret" impostors." impostors sneak around killing other players, without violence and without being seen. They cause trouble and have special skills, like the ability to travel through vents.

When a crewmate is killed, the other players go to a chat room to identify impostors. But impostors are also in the chat and can lie to confuse you. It can get loud and hilarious as you debate who's telling the truth and who's not. Whether you're right or wrong—or whether there's more than one impostor—determines what happens next. The rounds fly by, and Among Us can make you feel like you're right there with friends, even when you're apart.
